### **Student Evaluation**

## Assignments and Late Policy

All assignments will be made available on the course's web site. The availability of assignments and dates for quizzes will be announced on class and/or via email. Students are responsible for checking their e-mail on a regular basis.

The late penalty for assignments is  $2.5^i$  (2.5 to the  $i$ th power), where  $i > 0$  is the number of days you are late. So if you hand in your assignment 1 day late, you will be penalized 2%, a delay of 2 days will decrease your grade by 6%, 3 days is penalized 16% and 4 days takes 39% off your grade. You cannot be more than 4 days late.

The assignments are worth 76% of the overall mark for the course. If an assignment has to be cancelled for any reason, the remaining assignment weights will be prorated to add up to 76%. The quizzes are worth 24% of the overall mark for the course; if a quiz has to be cancelled, the weight of the remaining ones will be prorated to add up to 24%.

## Appeals of Assignment/Quizzes Marks

Appeals of assignment/quizzes marks should be addressed first to the T.A. who marked your assignment. If you and the T.A. cannot agree, then please discuss the situation with the lecturer.

Appeals **must occur within 1 week** from the first day that the marked work was made available to students. After that 1 week period has gone by, no more appeals will be considered.

## Email Contact and OWL
