We took a break for drinks and smokes and then Glen joined in, sawing planks with the swede saw and painting preservative on the decking. Toward the narrow end of the log, there were many branch stubs. The work slowed down because each of these had to be chiselled away to make room for the planking. By about 4:30 we had the bridge decked all the way to the creek flats and a fine job it was!

We carried all our tools and spare lumber back up to the van, then stood around to chat. Just then, I though I heard a Great Horned Owl. "Shhh!" We listened. Yup. then another, then a third! For a while it seemed like Eva's woods were full of owls, but we can only say 3 for sure, judging from the different directions. There was a lull, so I gave my own GHO call. They all immediately answered.
