Purpose: check butterfly fauna

I broadcast a bagful of BE seeds (collected at home by Pat) into the creek bluffs, then drove down to the trailer, where I parked, put out birdseed, and checked the trees in the regen zone. A BC has developed a serious case of brown leafspot and the leaves are turning yellow.

I walked the 2BT, stopping by the pipe bridge to further my familiarity with plants. A tall, yellow flowered plant growing in a large patch near the pipe bridge turned out to be Fringed Loosestrife. I spent most of the time watching/listening for birds and wandering in the vicinity of the trailer, looking for butterflies (see list below).

I walked to the river, surprising a mother duck and her twelve ducklings. The mother performed a convincing wounded bird act, making her way toward the mouth of FC, while her young paddled in a panic for the far shore of the river and the safety of overhanging branches. The mother was smallish, with a white patch on her cheek. Although I did not see a crest, the white patch on the cheek makes the Common Merganser the likely ID.
