At Last Some Snow!

purpose: to check property

In spite of warnings that I might not be able to get into the property, I came anyway, trusting in my new Hankook (Korean) snow tires with enlarged tread blocks. The gate was piled up with freshly plowed snow, so I had to dig around it in order to get it open. The Upper Meadow (UM) was covered by about 9" of snow, but the Windstar ate it for dessert, arriving at the trailer after an eerily muffled ride. Average snow depth around the trailer was 16.5 cm, a later measurement in the woods yielding 22 cm. Although I arrived under a gloomy overcast, the sky began to break up and, within an hour, all was bright and sunny.

It took quite a while before any birds showed up at the replenished feeders. As if to make up for this, I had one somewhat unusual visitor, an American Tree Sparrow, complete with rufous cap and ebony stickpin.

I walked to the river, changing the trail cam card as I went. A Pileated Woodpecker shrieked several times as I walked through the thick snow on Edgar's Trail and, when I got to the river, I was treated to an unusual sight that a Sibley would be sure to add to his catalogue of bird behaviour: A flock of Wild Turkeys flew across the river, one at a time, at 10-second intervals. There would come a "gobble-gobble-cluck-cluck" sound (as if to say, "Okay, Bill here: It's my turn now!") and then a flap of mighty wings as another great bird soars across the river to the north side, where the flock is reassembling.

I took a wee meal in the trailer, then packed up to leave, having earlier turned the van around and prepared a takeoff track for it. (not needed today, but sometimes necessary to develop what I call "escape velocity.") Almost as soon as I gained the UM, three deer raced for their lives across the track ahead of me, heading for the East Ravine. I took it as a "good-bye."
